Dear Parent/Carer and Pupils

As we work towards the final week of what has been an unprecedented year, the following news items will help us all with the end of term arrangements as well as the return to school in September.

First of all, we hope our pupils and families enjoyed Eid-al-Adha last weekend. This is the Muslim 'festival of the sacrifice' or more known colloquially as 'Big Eid'.

Hot weather: As you will be aware it has been unusually hot recently and we are aware that temperatures on Monday are forecast to get as high as 33/34 degrees centigrade.

The school has already relaxed school uniform protocols and pupils are not required to wear jumpers and ties until the return to school in September. We have also purchased 2 large pallets of water for pupils. We would encourage all pupils to bring water bottles which can be filled at the various water machines around school.

On Monday and Tuesday next week, pupils can choose to wear their PE kit into school instead of the relaxed uniform, if they wish.

For Monday 18 and Tuesday 19 July, parents/carers may wish to review sending children into school who suffer physically or emotionally in high temperatures. If you decide to keep your child at home on Monday/Tuesday, please inform the school's attendance office before the end of school on Friday so that the attendance team can correctly code the school registers. Charity Updates: Very well done to all the pupils who took part in the French, Spanish and Ukranian Spelling Bee recently. Over £2000 was raised in support of Unicef. Our ASDAN pupils have also been fundraising for Mencap and raised £219.52 with their cake and bake sales. Very well done to all involved!

Induction Day: Our recent Year 6 Induction Day was a huge success with well over 330 new Year 6 pupils in school for the day. They really got involved in the day and we wish them every success when they join us full-time in September.

Rewards Trips: These have been taking place this week with over 1000 pupils enjoying the day out in super weather. Very well done with your behaviour and focus on school and learning this academic year.

Year 11 Prom: The school held a very successful end of Year 11 prom with 200 pupils for the first time in three years, after the Year 11 GCSE examinations. It was a great event. Next year's Year 11 prom is to be held on Tuesday 27 June 2023 at Rogerthorpe Manor Hotel.

Results Day: This year's results day for Year 11 is on Thursday 25 August 2022. School will be open from 9.30am and results will also be available through Edulink. For college places, pupils will require their results on school headed paper so we would advise pupils to come into school. Careers support will be available in school on results day.

On warm days, stay out of open water

Cold water shock and under-water currents can kill, and you don't know what's lurking beneath the surface

We urge you to share this message and the video from Yorkshire Water with parents and students to warn them of the dangers of open water.

During the current heatwave, we're urging everyone to be aware of the risks of cooling off or playing in ponds, lakes, and flooded quarries.

Swimming in open water is extremely dangerous as hidden dangers can lurk beneath the surface.

This can include discarded waste which can trap people, as well as slippery rocks and sudden changes in water depth. Jumping into cold water can also cause people to go into shock.

Previous warm and sunny weather has seen people risking their lives, and sadly losing their lives, by swimming in open water – despite signs warning them not too.

We're urging people to call 999 immediately if they see anyone in danger.
