Body Language

What is it? Communicating an emotion such as anger, fear or aggression simply by the posing of your arms, shoulders and facial expressions without you saying a word.

Facial Expression

What is it? Communicating a characters emotions or feelings through the use of facial expressions. This is a key nonverbal form of communication.

<u>Accent</u>

What is it? A distinctive mode of pronunciation of a language (changing your voice) to reflect your characters social class, ethnicity and background.

Gestures

What is it? A movement or position of the hand, arm, body, head, or face that is expressive of an idea, opinion or emotion Kettlethorpe

Tone of voice

What is it? The emotion or feeling behind the voice, such as happy, sad, angry, frustrated, worried and excited.

Narration

What is it? A technique whereby one or more performers speak directly to the audience to tell a story, give information or comment on the action of the scene or the motivations of characters.

Still Image

What is it? Also known as a freeze frame or tableau. It is when performers freeze on stage to emphasis a key moment in the action.


Soundscape

What is it? It is a collection of sounds created either by the actors themselves or by other means such as music. A soundscape is used to create the atmosphere of a scene through sound only.

Role On The Wall:

What is it? A strategy which allows you to visually plan key characteristics (emotions and behaviours) of a character which you are creating.

The technique allows a person to develop a deeper understanding of their characters motivations.

<u>Role Play:</u>

<u>Crosscutting / Split</u> Stage:


What is it? It is two scenes go on at the same time on stage, one stage left and one stage right. Each scene can be in a different time or place.

Stage Combat:

What is it?

A way of safely performing a fight sequence on stage. Performed in this way, no actors gets hurt, but it looks real for the audience.

Sound Scape:

What is it? It is a collection of sounds created either by the actors themselves or by other means such as music. A soundscape is used to create the atmosphere of a scene through sound only,

Conscience Alley:

A useful technique for exploring any kind of dilemma faced by a character, providing an opportunity to analyse a decisive moment in greater detail. The class forms two lines facing each other.









Script:

What is it? A script consists of dialogue/text which says what the characters say to each other.

Stage Directions:

What is it? An instruction written in the script of a play that gives direction to the actors

The instruction could relate to the movement, position, or tone of an actor.

What is it? A manner of speaking or pronunciation e.g. a foreign or regional accent.

<u>Accent:</u>

Emphasis:

What is it? The pressure on individual words that makes them stand out. Emphasis or stress for a particular effect is significant and can change the meaning of a sentence as well as the feeling behind it. Half Term

Narrative Dance:

Definition: A dance that tells a story

Stimulus:

Definition: The starting point of a dance / something that is used to inspire a dance piece.

<u>Motif:</u>

Definition: A short sequence of movement which communicates the theme/intent of the dance

It is repeated and developed in the dance.

Motif Development:

Definition: Ways in which a motif a changed and varied

E.g. changing the order of the actions, reversing the order of the actions, adding in actions, changing the dynamics of the movement


