WHY AN APPRENTICESHIP IN THE AK **EVEN BETTER**

You are paid as a soldier in the Army, not as an apprentice. With a starting salary of over £23,000 after basic training, you are earning far more than most apprenticeship schemes offer.

You are getting 'on the job' training with the Army, but with equipment and in environments that are more varied. interesting and challenging.

You will always have support and guidance on hand from fully trained experts, but as a qualified soldier you are in a trusted position with responsibilities.

You already have a well-paid job as a soldier. An apprenticeship in the Army will assist with your progression into higher paid ranks.

The apprenticeship is just the start of many opportunities within the Army to gain further qualifications. From level 3 or 4 apprenticeships to degree or masters level qualifications, the Army invests in career-long development.

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Jordan, aged 19

Infantry Soldier Apprenticeship: Public Services Level 2

"I joined the Army because I like to be active and not stuck in an office.

It was a surprise to find out you do apprenticeships in the infantry. I've done much better in the Army with my Maths and English than I ever did in school – quickly obtaining Functional Skills 1, and I've just taken level 2 as part of the apprenticeship programme. Having small classes means I've progressed quickly.



When I did the mortar course, having better maths skills helped me with things like working out elevations and bearings.

Next year, I'm going to do a survival course. You have to navigate, find or hunt your own food, and keep yourself warm.

Most weekends I go home to Sheffield and see my family, and pick out my next tattoo!"



Rich, aged 26

HR Specialist, Adjutant General's Corps **Apprenticeship:** Business Administrator Level 3

"What I love about being an HR Specialist is that we work with all the different parts of the Army – no post will be the same. You still do the soldier stuff, shooting, marching etc, but you also get to be an office professional, with qualifications valued by businesses.

I really enjoy the trust that is put into me in my role: people from all ranks come for advice and help on finance and administration. We are problem solvers.

Even though I have a degree in furniture design, I was drawn to becoming a professional in business administration and I'm loving it."



Nicola, aged 25

Electronics Technician, Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (REME) Apprenticeship: Engineering Manufacture Level 3

"I love the challenge I get in my job every day.

At college, I studied make up artistry, then got a job in customer services. I liked working with people but didn't feel settled. I hated being stationary all day: doing the same thing over and over, so I decided to join the Army.

I didn't think I was technically minded, but when I was on Basic Training, the instructors saw something in me, and suggested I became an electronics technician. I'd never really challenged myself like that before.

When I finished my initial trade training, I promoted. Now I'm with my battalion where we can work on anything with electronics: from tanks to dentist equipment. Every day is different.

Next month I'm going to Austria to go skiing for the first time. I just want to take up all the opportunities and experiences I can in the Army."

Joe, aged 35

Royal Corps of Signals, Cyber Engineer – Infrastructure Engineer Apprenticeship: Network Cable Installer Apprenticeship Level 3

"I served for a few years with the Infantry, but decided to take my career in a different direction and swapped to the Royal Signals.

I had no idea about the qualifications I could get in the Royal Signals but I've loved the opportunity to get qualified

In my job, we install communications infrastructure such as phonelines and

fibre optics. We are constantly updating what we do to include the latest technology which I really enjoy.

During my apprenticeship I deployed to Kenya and Bahrain – with lots of responsibilities as the single expert in comms installation. I'm now working towards the next level qualification which means I can supervise a team."

HOW LONG DOES AN APPRENTICESHIP TAKE?

Between 366 days and four years, depending on the Apprenticeship.

I'M GOING INTO THE INFANTRY, WHY DO I NEED TO DO AN APPRENTICESHIP?

An apprenticeship shows that you are skilled and experienced in your career. This is no different for an Infantry soldier – it also provides an excellent foundation from which you can progress onto further gualifications.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

I ALREADY HAVE 5 GCSES AT C/4, CAN I START A LEVEL 3 APPRENTICESHIP?

The Apprenticeship is about your trade. The level of your apprenticeship depends on the type of role you are starting. In some cases this may be a level 2.

IS WORKING TOWARDS AN APPRENTICESHIP OPEN TO EVERY SOLDIER OR DO YOU NEED TO MEET CERTAIN CRITERIA TO BE SELECTED?

If you meet the requirements to do the role, you are eligible to do the relevant apprenticeship. You may need to take Functional Skills in Maths and English if you do not hold the GCSE/Scottish N5 at the grade required by your level of apprenticeship

WHEN DO I START MY APPRENTICESHIP AS A SOLDIER?

You will enrol on an apprenticeship at the end of basic training and start your apprenticeship with your trade training, where you learn the skills specific to your job role.

WHAT PERCENTAGE OF SOLDIERS ACHIEVE AN APPRENTICESHIP?

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APPRENTICESHIPS

Of those starting an apprenticeship about 85% achieve the qualification. Of those who do not complete, it is usually because they leave the Army or change job role and so change programmes.

DOIGET AN APPRENTICESHIP FROM THE ARMY FOUNDATION COLLEGE HARROGATE (AFC HARROGATE)?

You start your apprenticeship journey at AFC Harrogate, but you will complete your apprenticeship as part of your trade training in your job role.
