Two courses...two grades!

The pupils will achieve two grades: English Language and English Literature.

English Language

Paper 1 – fiction

Paper 2 – non-fiction

1 hour 45 minutes each

There are 5 questions on each paper: 4 reading questions and one writing question.

Both papers are worth 80 marks



The questions can be completed in any order that they want to.

These are the key skills that the pupils need to use.

English Literature

Paper 1 – Shakespeare and 19th Century Novel (1 hour 45 minutes)
Macbeth and A Christmas Carol

One Macbeth question and an extract to support.

One Christmas Carol question and an extract to support.

Paper 2 – Modern texts and poetry (2 hours 15 minutes) An Inspector Calls and Anthology

Choose one question from a choice of two for An Inspector Calls. There is no extract.

A comparison of two poems from the anthology with a copy of one of the poems.

Two questions on an unseen poem.



15 minutes should be used to read and annotate the texts provided.

Look in detail at this extract, from lines 16 to 26 of the source:

It came on great oiled, resilient, striding legs. It towered thirty feet above half of the trees, a great evil god, folding its delicate watchmaker's claws close to its oily reptilian chest. Each lower leg was a piston, a thousand pounds of white bone, sunk in thick ropes of muscle, sheathed over in a gleam of pebbled skin like the armour of a terrible warrior. Each thigh was a ton of meat, ivory, and steel mesh. And from the great breathing cage of the upper body those two delicate arms dangled out front, arms with hands which might pick up and examine men like toys, while the snake neck coiled. And the head itself, a ton of sculptured stone, lifted easily upon the sky. Its mouth gaped, exposing a fence of teeth like daggers. Its eyes rolled, ostrich eggs, empty of all expression save hunger. It closed its mouth in a death grin. It ran, its pelvic bones crushing aside trees and bushes, its taloned feet clawing damp earth, leaving prints six inches deep wherever it settled its weight.

How does the writer use language here to describe the Tyrannosaurus Rex?

You could include the writer's choice of:

- words and phrases
- language features and techniques
- sentence forms.


The pupils should be analysing the text and picking out the relevant evidence. They shouldn't just pick out the words, but they should also make sure that they explain the EFFECT.






Teams can be used for independent revision throughout Y11.

Individual teachers will add more on the individual class pages as the year continues. These are likely to be tailored to their individual group. How can Microsoft Teams be used for revision?






Language





Literature







Homework will be set by individual teachers. This could range from producing exam responses to creating their own revision resources and materials.

GCSE Pod is a resource that the pupils all know from their homework in Y10.

It is a fantastic resource to use to revise the key texts and poems for literature. There are video clips and questions linked to characters and plot.





What can you do to support?

'You can't revise for English!' Yes, you can!

This is a conversation we have had many times over the years with pupils. There are a wealth of revision resources available, and it is no coincidence that those pupils who access them are more likely to succeed.

You can help at home by supporting with them with a few simple tasks for English.



Examples:

Literature

Ask them questions about the key texts.

Ask them about the plot and characters.

There are versions of the texts that you can watch as well.

Language

The writing is key in paper 1. Pick a picture from Google and they could write a description of the scene.

Reading doesn't all have to be about fiction – although this does help! Reading magazines, newspapers, online articles and other non-fiction texts can help to understand the tone and vocab of these texts. This is very important for paper 2.
